ANNUAL REPORT & PROXY MATERIALS: WHAT WILL YOU RECEIVE?

BBNC will be electronically delivering an annual meeting packet to voting shareholders over 18 who have an email on file and have opted-in for electronic communications on the myBBNC portal at mybbnc.net.

Those who have not opted-in to receive electronic communications at mybbnc.net will receive a paper annual meeting packet.

Here's what you can look for in August:

1. Annual Report: This report details the financial activities of the corporation for the 2023 fiscal year, ended March 31, 2023.

2. Notice of Annual Meeting and Proxy Statement: This is an official announcement of the 2023 BBNC Annual Meeting of Shareholders, which explains the purpose of the meeting. The proxy statement explains the issues that are expected to come before the shareholders at the annual meeting and instructions for completing and returning your signed proxy or an online proxy prior to the annual meeting.

3. BBNC Proxy: Shareholders will receive a paper proxy as well as an electronic PIN to vote online instead of by mail. By submitting your proxy online through BBNC's online voting system at bbncvote.net, you'll be eligible for special online voting cash prizes!

4. Return Envelope: The postage-paid envelope to be used to return your paper proxy.

2023 ANNUAL MEETING OF SHAREHOLDERS

The 2023 Annual Meeting of Shareholders is scheduled for Saturday, October 7, 2023, at 10:00 a.m., in Dillingham, Alaska. BBNC will provide more details about the annual meeting in proxy materials which will be mailed out in mid-August.

The meeting will be held for the purpose of electing four directors to three-year terms ending in 2026, as well as reviewing the corporation's performance for the fiscal year ended March 31, 2023.

ANNUAL MEETING WEBCAST

The 2023 annual meeting will be broadcast live on the web! This live broadcast will allow shareholders to watch the annual meeting in real time on October 7.

RECIPE CORNER: ATSIURAQ

Ingredients:

4 c. lowbush cranberries, thawed
2 c. sugar
2/3 c. corn starch
6 c. water

Instructions:

1. Place the lowbush cranberries in a large pot and mash with a potato masher.

2. Add the sugar and stir, mixing it with the berries.

3. Place on stove burner and add four cups of water, stirring slowly over medium heat.

4. Bring to a rolling boil, stirring constantly, and reduce heat to between medium and low.

5. In a separate bowl, mix corn starch with one cup of water until corn starch is completely dissolved.

6. Add corn starch mixture to pot of cooking cranberries, slowly stirring constantly.

7. Bring to a second boil, stirring constantly for two minutes.

8. Turn burner off and let cool. Serve with canned milk, half and half, or eat plain.

BBCH Companies Save a Desert Oasis in Southern Arizona

Bristol Bay Construction Holdings LLC's (BBCH) Civil and Environmental business lines joined forces on a project to upgrade the Quitobaquito Springs and Pond at Organ Pipe Cactus National Monument in Ajo, Arizona, for the National Park Service (NPS).

Quitobaquito Springs and Pond is a unique, rare desert oasis composed of a man-made water system located in the Sonoran Desert just north of the U.S.-Mexico border. It consists of two developed spring heads, a conveyance channel, and a historic man-made pond covering about 0.75 acres.

The site has been inhabited by tribal units, ranchers, and missionaries for hundreds of years and used as a sacred area for ceremonies. It is also the habitat and only water source for numerous desert creatures, including endangered species such

as the Quitobaquito Pupfish and Sonoyta Mud Turtle. In 2006, NPS staff started employing emergency actions to maintain water in the pond after low water episodes and declining spring input.

SES Civil and Environmental LLC lead the design-build effort to reduce the pond surface area to lessen evaporation, minimize leakage, and deepen the smaller footprint to provide a long-term water source for continued breeding of the endangered species and support the Native wildlife and tribal heritages.

The team carefully transferred the aquatic inhabitants of the pond to temporary refuges to protect them from the impacts of construction and began executing the upgrades including dewatering, dredging and excavation, compaction, liner installation, backfill, placement



of rock/stone material to provide sediment, erosion control, and aquatic organism habitat, and limit plant growth.

They also completed construction of a concrete channel from the spring to the new rock channel to allow endangered species to migrate upstream using a special lime-free concrete as a non-toxic alternative. Lastly, they finalized construction of an inlet rock chute from the new concrete channel to the pond.



BRISTOL PROJECT HIGHLIGHT: PROVOST MARSHAL'S OFFICE

Bristol Design Build Services, LLC, was contracted by the Naval Facilities Engineering Systems Command (NAVFAC) Southwest to design and construct a Provost Marshal's Office building that would house law enforcement and physical security personnel at the Marine Corps Recruit Depot in San Diego, California.

The \$9.9 million contract scope included a 9,100 square-foot building with an armory, dispatch, holding cells, interrogation rooms, criminal investigation department, and numerous training areas.



The structure was built directly on a dredged geographical fault line, so the project team installed approximately 500 Geopier piles to support the building during a seismic event.

To compensate for ground compaction challenges due to a sand base and high-water mark, Bristol Design Build Services, LLC used low-density fill to backfill the main sewer connection. In specific rooms on the interior of the building, drywall was glued directly to concrete masonry units to eliminate spaces for detainees to store contraband.

The Naval Information Warfare Center (NIWC) is based on the east coast and handles intrusion detection systems required for this type of facility.

The Bristol Design Build Services, LLC team prioritized strong project communication and installed infrastructure throughout the building resulting in a seamless transition once NIWC occupied the facility.
