Letter from the President



It's a season of activity and change. This fall is an important time to make our voices heard, individually and collectively, by voting this November.

Voting for our representation at all levels of government is one of the most fundamental rights we hold as Americans. And while we treasure the remoteness of our region and everything it provides, we also recognize that exercising the right to vote in places like Bristol Bay can require more planning to ensure the proper documents are obtained and key deadlines are met, especially for mail-in ballots.

Nationally, Election Day this year falls on Tuesday, November 3. In Alaska, voter registration closes on October 4; early voting begins October 19; and the last day to request an absentee ballot is October 24. I encourage everyone to take the necessary steps to vote this fall.

It's "meeting season" again, and for the first time in several years, BBNC is hosting our Annual Meeting of Shareholders in-region. We'll be at the Bristol Bay Borough School in Naknek on Saturday, October 3.

I am really looking forward to seeing folks and meeting our shareholders where they are, whether that's at the annual meeting or one of our upcoming informational meetings.

We are one region, but it's a big region, which makes it so incredibly valuable to hear about the unique challenges and opportunities each community is facing. We truly appreciate everyone who takes the time to join us, share their perspectives, gather with friends and family, and share what it means to be a BBNC shareholder.

At this year's meetings, we'll also be able to share some good news: our pragmatic, conservative investment approach is paying off. Even with high costs and economic uncertainty, BBNC's corporate-level performance remains strong. BBNC performed well in the first quarter of this fiscal year, and we are maintaining that momentum with an understanding that market conditions could change at any time.

In Bristol Bay, we know that high fuel costs and basic fuel availability—challenges often brought by factors

far outside of our control—continue to challenge BBNC shareholders and our local economy. Our options can be limited, but BBNC continues working with elected officials and other leaders to find solutions where we can. And while this year's sockeye return didn't reach the legendary levels we've seen in recent years, it was still a solid run by nearly all accounts.

Thank you for engaging with your corporation and we hope to see you at an upcoming informational meeting or the annual meeting in Naknek.

Empowering Our Communities: Native Voter Engagement Across Alaska

Local groups in Bristol Bay and across the state are working to encourage Alaska Native people to exercise our strength in numbers by voting in the November election.

Get Out the Native Vote (GOTNV) is working to bring back the “culture of civic participation” within Alaska Native communities, according to Director Michelle Sparck.

In the 1980s, roughly nine of every ten Alaska Native voters turned out to vote—a number that’s fallen to less than three of every ten as of 2024. In Bristol Bay, though the number of registered voters has nearly doubled since 1982, fewer people today are actually casting their ballots.

Michelle reminds voters that rebuilding the tradition of participating starts with each one of us. “The Elders showed us the way, and we can own our power again,” she said.

Turning our region’s strong history of advocating for issues like subsistence into strong voter turnout today is an ongoing goal for the United Tribes of Bristol Bay (UTBB).

One way this happens is through UTBB’s Community Outreach Assistant (COA) Program, which is currently employing 11 COAs in villages across the region. The program, which is made possible through partners including BBNC, the Bristol Bay Economic Development Corporation, and Bristol Bay Guardians, allows the COAs to develop essential skills and earn remote work experience while working on projects that advance community priorities, like increasing civic engagement.

UTBB Executive Director Alannah Hurley said an in-person presence in communities is by far the most impactful way they’ve found to increase voter education and turnout. Though there are a limited number of COAs, she said that coordinated efforts between

organizations across the region aim to ensure non-partisan voter outreach takes place in every community of 10 or more people.

“The impact of having an engaged, educated electorate across the country is absolutely critical,” said Alannah. “We’re seeing challenging times across the nation, and I truly believe the more informed we are, the more educated we are about what’s happening, and the more empowered people feel, the better outcomes we can have in these systems that are supposed to be working for the people.”

UTBB and partners like GOTNV are also working to ensure communities are informed about their options for voting leading up to Election Day, since voting methods vary depending on the village. Additionally, anyone attending the Alaska Federation of Natives Convention from October 22–24 in Anchorage can easily walk across the street from the Dena’ina Center to vote at City Hall, where ballots for all 40 House districts are available.

families and all who were touched by their leadership and kindness.

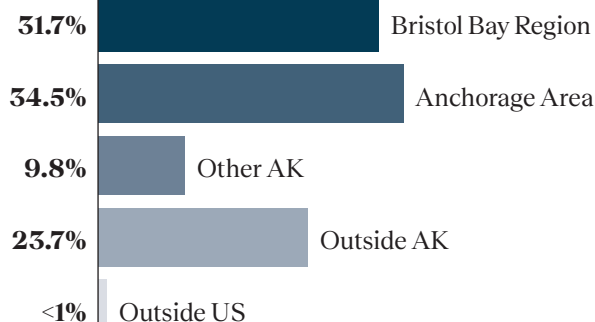
Shareholder Demographics

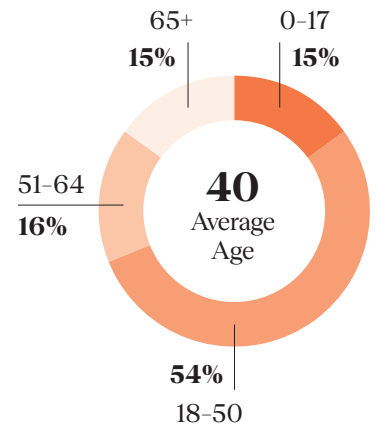

Journey of Hope: Bristol Bay Cancer Survivor Gathering at Mission Lodge

A Journey of Hope cancer survivor event brought Bristol Bay survivors, caregivers, and medical advocates together for a restorative weekend at Mission Lodge. With the peaceful lake and lodge as the backdrop, participants connected through shared stories, healing activities, and moments of reflection that honored each survivor's unique journey.

The day featured a guided survivor circle led by breast cancer survivor Ayyu Qassataq, creative expression through rock painting, and an evening candle-lighting ceremony where attendees honored their journeys to overcome cancer. Shared meals, storytelling, and time to relax helped build new bonds among participants who often face survivorship in isolation.

Though the schedule was full, the most meaningful impact came from the connections formed throughout the weekend. Survivors left Mission Lodge feeling supported, empowered, and encouraged to continue building community-based advocacy and support networks across Bristol Bay.

One participant captured the experience beautifully: "It ended up being more meaningful than I knew how to express at the time."

During her internship, Sasha worked closely with scientists studying salmon fisheries in the Chignik region. She learned about tools and operations used in the field, salmon biology, and migration patterns, all under the mentorship of Johnny Singleton.

BRISTOL PROJECT HIGHLIGHT: REMEDIAL ACTION – NELLIS SMALL ARMS RANGE ANNEX

Bristol Environmental Solutions, LLC, was contracted by the US Army Corps of Engineers (USACE) Los Angeles District for remedial actions at Nellis Small Arms Range Annex in North Las Vegas, Nevada.

The remedial action required two contracts to remove lead and antimony and polycyclic aromatic hydrocarbons contaminated soil from historical aerial gunnery training locations. The original contract completed in 2025 remediated 170 acres through excavation, transportation and disposal of 290,000 tons of contaminated soil, and the current contract scope involves the remediation of the remaining 52.5 acres of 100,000 tons of contaminated soil.



Remedial actions that were self-performed include all heavy equipment operation, excavation and hauling of excavated soil to the soil staging area, Resource Conservation and Recovery Act (RCRA) disposal characterization sampling, loading of staged soil for transportation for disposal and compliance with Clark County Department of Air Quality (CC DAQ) dust control requirements.

During fieldwork, more than 72,000 hours of field work were completed with no safety violations resulting in lost time. To learn more about the Bristol Alliance of Companies and our projects, visit www.bristol-companies.com.

CCI Industrial Services employees continue to show the skill, commitment, and work ethic that set our team apart across Alaska. At the Seawater Injection Plant, Daniel Jackson was recognized for exceptional weld repair work on a recent leak under challenging conditions. His dedication and high-quality craftsmanship enabled a timely restart of the facilities and earned strong praise from the Hilcorp Seawater team.

The GC2 Fab Shop team also received customer recognition for their support during the PTU-19 startup. After repeated failures with a 3-inch valve, the team helped install a larger severe-service valve, requiring custom spool pieces, creative problem-solving, and fast turnaround. Their precise fabrication—fitting correctly the first time with no field modifications—helped maintain progress on Hilcorp's largest-producing well. Hilcorp commended the team's responsiveness, craftsmanship, and can-do attitude.

ANSEP: INSPIRING THE NEXT GENERATION

BBCH Support Services, LLC (BBCH-SS) was pleased to participate in this year's Alaska Native Science and Engineering Program (ANSEP) Middle School Academy (MSA) at the University of Alaska Anchorage from May 25–31, 2026. The academy was sponsored by BBNC and the Bristol Bay Foundation and welcomed 37 middle school students from the Lake and Peninsula, Bristol Bay Borough, Dillingham City, and Southwest Regional Schools districts.

Representatives from BBCH-SS—Evan Barman and Marshall Burns, Business Development Directors—presented a learning activity designed to support the MSA's science and engineering curriculum. The activity highlighted two of BBCH's core businesses: construction and environmental services. They were joined by Melissa Aspelund Turolska, a Naknek native and BBNC shareholder who works at ConocoPhillips Alaska.

Students learned about the importance of water, water pollution, water sources, the need for filtration, and different types of filtration. Applying their knowledge, students constructed homemade water filters using readily available materials at Goose Lake. They poured dirty water—mixed with "pollutants" such as dirt, leaves, and sticks—through their filters, collecting and testing the water for clarity. Each group rebuilt several iterations of their filters, improving their designs each time. It was an exciting, hands-on activity and a rewarding experience for all participants!





First Quarter Fiscal Year (FY) 2027 MD&A & Financials

The Management Discussion and Analysis (MD&A) presents a narrative of the financial condition and results of operations of Bristol Bay Native Corporation (BBNC or the Corporation) from management's perspective. It is intended to give readers of the Corporation's financial statements a clear understanding of performance for the fiscal quarter and should be read together with the accompanying unaudited consolidated quarterly financial statements. The Corporation's fiscal year ends March 31. The first quarter of fiscal year 2027 (Q1 FY2027) covers the three months ended June 30, 2026, and the prior-year comparative period covers the three months ended June 30, 2025. Amounts are unaudited.

BUSINESS OVERVIEW

BBNC is an Alaska Native Regional Corporation created pursuant to the Alaska Native Claims Settlement Act (ANCSA) of 1971. Congress enacted ANCSA to resolve longstanding conflicts surrounding aboriginal land claims in Alaska and to facilitate resource development in the state. Incorporated as a for-profit entity, the Corporation operates for the benefit of Alaska Natives with ties to the Bristol Bay region. Operating throughout the United States and internationally, BBNC's

operations divide broadly into two categories: operational subsidiaries and the Investment Portfolio. The operational subsidiaries span five business lines: Industrial Services, Construction, Government Services, Seafood, and Tourism. During the prior fiscal year, the Corporation expanded its operational portfolio to include specialized lending and capital assistance services directed at small and medium-sized businesses. The Investment Portfolio comprises marketable

securities, non-marketable equity-method investments, and alternative investment vehicles. The Corporation also realizes earnings from natural resource activities, predominantly through Section 7(i) revenue-sharing payments received from other Alaska Native corporations, as provided under ANCSA.

RESULTS OF OPERATIONS

For the three months ended June 30, 2026, the Corporation's results reflect continued revenue growth

while consolidated earnings eased relative to the prior-year period. Revenue grew 11.7%, or \$95.9 million, to \$916.2 million. EBITDA (earnings before interest, taxes, depreciation, and amortization) decreased 27.1%, or \$15.0 million, to \$40.4 million. Net earnings attributable to BBNC decreased 48.0%, or \$10.4 million, to \$11.2 million.

The Corporation delivered revenue growth and improved operating results this quarter, with combined EBITDA from the five operating segments increasing over the prior-year period. Consolidated EBITDA and net earnings were lower than the prior-year period, which benefited from a significant unrealized gain on privately held investments in the Investment Portfolio that did not recur in the current quarter. Setting that prior-year item aside, the Corporation's operating businesses strengthened year-over-year.

INDUSTRIAL SERVICES

Industrial Services generated revenue of \$617.2 million, an increase of \$121.3 million, or 24.5%. Earnings from operations grew \$1.6 million, or 15.4%, to \$12.2 million, and EBITDA increased \$4.4 million, or 16.5%, to \$31.3 million. The segment represented 77.6% of consolidated EBITDA, compared with 48.6% in the prior year.

CONSTRUCTION

Construction generated revenue of \$161.1 million, a decrease of \$5.7 million, or 3.4%. Earnings from operations declined \$1.8 million, or 24.1%, to \$5.5 million, and EBITDA declined \$1.6 million, or 16.6%, to \$8.0 million. The segment represented 19.8% of consolidated EBITDA, compared with 17.3% in the prior year.

GOVERNMENT SERVICES

Government Services generated revenue of \$102.2 million, a decrease of \$11.7 million, or 10.2%. Earnings from operations decreased \$0.5 million, or 5.9%, to \$8.7 million, and EBITDA decreased \$0.4 million, or 3.9%, to \$10.1 million. The segment represented 25.0% of consolidated EBITDA, compared with 19.0% in the prior year.

SEAFOOD

Seafood generated revenue of \$26.5 million, an increase of \$4.4 million, or 20.0%. Earnings from operations increased \$1.3 million, or 49.1%, to \$3.9 million, and EBITDA increased \$1.1 million, or 39.1%, to \$3.8 million. The segment represented 9.5% of consolidated EBITDA, compared with 5.0% in the prior year.

TOURISM

Tourism generated revenue of \$2.6 million, an increase of \$0.5 million, or 21.7%. The loss from operations improved \$0.1 million, or 5.4%, to \$1.7 million, and the EBITDA loss improved \$0.1 million, or 10.2%, to \$1.2 million. The segment represented negative 2.9% of consolidated EBITDA, compared with negative 2.3% in the prior year.

INVESTMENT PORTFOLIO

As of June 30, 2026, the total market value of the Investment Portfolio was \$216.4 million, an increase of \$1.0 million, or 0.48%, from \$215.4 million as of March 31, 2026. The increase was driven primarily by appreciation of investments in privately held companies in North America and funding of outstanding capital commitments to private equity managers.

NATURAL RESOURCE MANAGEMENT

Natural resource earnings are driven primarily by income from Section 7(i) revenue sharing, net of the 50% distribution to village corporations and at-large shareholders, which the Corporation receives from other regional Alaska Native corporations. The Corporation also generates revenue from natural resource sales, such as gravel and rock, largely tied to community-scale resource development and infrastructure projects in the Bristol Bay region. Given the nature of these activities, natural resource revenues vary from period-to-period.

LIQUIDITY AND CASH FLOWS

The Corporation's liquidity consists of cash and cash equivalents, marketable securities, and availability under its revolving credit facilities, with cash from operations serving as the primary source of liquidity. During FY2026, BBNC refinanced its line of credit facility, increasing borrowing capacity to \$450.0 million. Two revolving credit facilities collectively provide up to \$475.0 million of financing to support the operating companies' working-capital needs and general corporate programs. As of June 30, 2026, BBNC maintained a liquidity position of \$360.1 million, comprised of \$41.3 million in cash and cash equivalents, \$23.8 million in marketable securities, and \$295.0 million available under the revolving credit facilities. INDIGENOUS LANGUAGE STRATEGIC PLAN

Our languages carry more than words—they hold our histories, connections to the land, and knowledge passed from generation to generation. This year, the Bristol Bay Foundation is proud to share the Bristol Bay Regional Indigenous Language Revitalization Strategic Plan, the first region-wide plan supporting Yup'ik, Dena'ina, and Alutiiq language revitalization across Bristol Bay.

The plan reflects the voices of more than 430 shareholders, descendants, Elders, educators, tribal leaders, and community members who shared their hopes and challenges. While each language community has unique needs, one message was clear: our languages are strongest when we work together. This strategic plan is a practical tool—created by and for tribes, schools, organizations, and communities—to build on existing efforts, strengthen partnerships, and create new opportunities for learners. It also includes a free “how to use” guide.

Over the next year, BBF will work with tribal councils, school districts, and regional partners to encourage formal adoption of the plan and support community-led leadership. Each village or community can tailor the plan to its specific needs.

Whether you're beginning to learn your language, teaching loved ones, supporting an Elder, or leading programming, there is a place for you in this work. Together, we can ensure our languages continue to be heard in our homes, schools, and communities, and on the lands that have lifted our people for generations.
